

## Restoring Rain's Reputation: What Everyone Can Do to Help

Rain by nature is important for replenishing drinking water supplies, recreation, and healthy wildlife habitats. It only becomes a problem when pollutants from our activities such as car maintenance, lawn care, and dog walking are left on the ground for rain to wash away. Here are some of the most important ways to prevent storm water pollution:

- Properly dispose of hazardous substances such as used oil, cleaning supplies and paint—never pour them down any part of the storm sewer system and report anyone who does.
- Use pesticides, fertilizers, and herbicides properly and efficiently to prevent excess runoff.
- Look for signs of soil and other pollutants, such as debris and chemicals, leaving construction sites in storm water runoff or tracked into roads by construction vehicles. Report poorly managed construction sites that could impact storm water runoff to your community.
- Install innovative storm water practices on residential property, such as rain barrels or rain gardens, that capture storm water and keep it on site instead of letting it drain away into the storm sewer system.
- Report any discharges from storm water outfalls during times of dry weather a sign that there could be a problem with the storm sewer system.
- Pick up after pets and dispose of their waste properly. No matter where pets make a mess in a backyard or at the park storm water runoff can carry pet waste from the land to the storm sewer system to a stream.
- Store materials that could pollute storm water indoors and use containers for outdoor storage that do not rust or leak to eliminate exposure of materials to storm water.

## The Flawed Law: Challenges to PA's E-Waste Recycling Programs

Finding a location to recycle your electronic devices can feel like an uphill battle. They won't be picked up with your trash by your hauler, many places restrict what types or sizes of electronics they take, and others charge by the pound. What is the current law that shapes these recycling realities in Pennsylvania? And how can we fix the issues with the current system to increase access to electronic recycling for people across the state?

The Covered Devices Recycling Act of 2010 (CDRA) was a good intentioned law developed to reclaim the valuable materials in e-waste, and to keep the more toxic components out of landfills. The CDRA applies to all "covered devices" which include TVs, desktop and laptop computers, computer monitors, and peripherals (such as keyboards, printers, and hard drives). The first part of the act is that covered devices cannot be disposed of in a landfill or other solid waste disposal facilities. This part of the law prohibits your trash hauler from accepting these devices with your curbside trash (although they may offer curbside pickup and delivery to a recycling facility for a fee). The second part of the law requires covered device manufacturers to "establish and conduct ongoing recycling programs that offer covered device collection opportunities at no cost to consumers."



Like many Pennsylvanians, you may realize that the realities of PA e-waste recycling programs are very different from the initial intentions of CDRA. According to the 2019 DEP Report to the General Assembly Covered Device Recycling Act, only 23.7% of the population has unrestricted

access to recycling opportunities under CDRA. Due to high demand for the recycling of items that are costly to recycle (such as CRT TVs), it is often cost-prohibitive for e-waste recycling vendors to operate in PA. According to a letter from the Electronics Recyclers Association of PA (ERAP), the PA E-Scrap Recycling industry is shrinking due to a lack of financial support from electronics manufacturers to cover collection, transportation, and recycling costs. This deficit leads electronics processors to close sites or restrict the services they offer.

It is important that the failings of the current law are fixed, but that it still maintains its initial goals. E-waste can contain hazardous materials such as lead, mercury, and cadmium. One of the reasons CRT TVs (Cathode Ray Tube Televisions) are so difficult to recycle is because of the leaded glass used for the cathode ray tubes. If not recycled or disposed of properly, these materials can contaminate the environment. Additionally, there are valuable and recoverable materials including gold, silver, copper, and aluminum in e-waste. By ensuring these materials are reclaimed and not lost into the landfill, we can conserve natural resources and reduce the amount of mining required to meet the demand for these materials.

What can we do to change the current issues with CDRA? Pennsylvania is just one of two states that does not allow recyclers like Best Buy to charge a nominal fee for accepting old CRT TVs. The recycling act should be amended to allow businesses to charge a recycling fee for accepting CRT TVs. ## Three Ways to Help Ambler Become Greener

Spring and summer have come and gone with the flower gardens in front of neighbors' houses and kids playing in the parks. If you've spent any time enjoying the seasons outdoors you've likely noticed the intense weather patterns lately, from heavy downpours to longer hotter days. Some days it's just too uncomfortable for that afternoon neighborhood stroll or even your own home is working hard to stay cool and dry. Maybe you've wondered if there is anything you can do. Is there anything singular individuals or families can do to create positive change? There is, grow our tree canopy!

Trees are more than decorative elements for neighborhoods. They provide shade, stormwater filtration, cleaner air, and more pleasant environments. Walking or driving down roads with or without trees you can feel the difference it makes to our comfort and overall health. Shade trees in developed residential and commercial spaces, such as Ambler, are important to plant now so that they can provide better quality air and walkable streets for us now and for our future neighbors. As an Ambler Borough resident, you are eligible for a discounted tree(s) both in the spring and fall that arrive already about 6-8 feet tall. The Ambler EAC offers free advice and volunteers to plant your tree for you. Members of Ambler Borough staff generously deliver the tree right to your home. Planting a tree in your front yard increases your property value, lowers your utility costs, decreases lawn erosion and if planted in a front or side yard, close to the street, it can even provide shade for those passing by.

For Borough residents who don't own a property, you can still

help grow and nourish our community trees by caring for a public or park tree. Ambler EAC's Adopt-a-Tree program matches community members with newly planted and young trees that need a little TLC to become strong and long-standing green assets to our community. Adopters are asked to water the tree weekly in times of little to no rain and to remove weeds from the tree pit. You can give your tree a name like Oliver Oak, or you can write the name of yourself, your children, your family or even your dog's name on the tree's tag as their proud caretaker.

If you don't have the means to adopt, donating a tree is another great option available to residents. These donated trees can either go to households who don't have the funds to buy their own tree or the Ambler EAC will coordinate with you to plant the tree in a public space. Donated trees are a great way to remember a loved one, celebrate a life event, or honor someone special in your life. When dedicating a tree, the Ambler EAC can place a tag on it with your loved one's name.



# Introducing the Ambler Community Garden, now growing at Knight Park

This year, a small but passionate group of volunteers literally got their hands dirty and created the Borough's first community garden. A garden is just what Ambler needed. Gardening has always been touted as a relaxing recreational activity that brings many rewards. Community Gardens are important ways for people to connect and interact with each other and to build and strengthen community. At Ambler's Community Garden, we are creating a space for individuals of all ages to learn, garden and to build interpersonal relationships. Sources of food, biodiversity, and community agriculture are just a few of the things our participants learn. The good thing about this garden is you don't need a green thumb.

This Community Garden has been created "for the community, by the community." This means that we grow together. Everyone who participates in the Garden shares responsibility for all the plots. They are not allocated.

In the spring of 2021 Ambler Borough received a Montco 2040 grant from the county to fund fencing and the building of raised beds for the Garden. Volunteers will share responsibility for weeding, watering, and harvesting. The food that is grown will be shared among the volunteers first and then donated accordingly. No one will be charged money for food that is grown. The Community Garden will provide many opportunities to people of all ages. We already have a group of dedicated people who are determined to make our Garden a success.

The Garden can also provide out of the classroom learning. We have already partnered with the Wissahickon High School and have had students volunteer in the garden. We know that community gardening is good for the mind, body, and soul. We know that teaching the community about gardening raises awareness of sustainability and can also bridge the area's food insecurity gaps.



Gardening is a great hobby for people of all ages, from children curious about where their food comes from to working individuals and retirees. It allows people to connect with their community and their environment. The members of the Ambler Community Garden want to promote healthy eating and celebrate what nature provides for us. ### PROPERTY OWNER TIPS FOR MAINTAINING AMBLER'S BEAUTY, WALKABILITY, AND CHARM

Walkability is one of the many cornerstones which makes Ambler a desirable place to live, work, and play. Sidewalks exist on the majority of all streets within the Borough and those connections are a vital part to the Borough's pedestrian-oriented small-town environment. Walkable communities such as Ambler lead to both economic and natural benefits, more social interactions, and encourage physical fitness. Maintaining these resources is a community wide effort. Property owners should be mindful and take notice of the following:

- Inspect your sidewalks to make sure that any tripping hazards such as broken or raised sidewalks are repaired or replaced to avoid any possible injuries to pedestrians.
- Maintain any plants, flowers, or trees along sidewalk edges so that they do not hang low or inhibit pedestrians passing by.
- Cut or trim areas along curb lines where weeds or grass maybe become overgrown. This area maintenance is the responsibility of property owners.
- Shovel the snow off all sidewalks as soon as possible to avoid possible fines or pedestrian injuries. In addition, if there is a fire hydrant on your property be sure to clear a 3ft radius around the hydrant and a clear path to the street.

Property owners are encouraged to work with their neighbors to maintain sidewalks throughout the Borough. If you see any of the above violations feel free to contact the Ambler Borough Code Department to investigate. Working together we can all do our part to provide and maintain safe, clean, attractive, and walkable neighborhoods.

#### WINTER IS COMING....

As winter approaches snow is not far behind. Residents are reminded to shovel the snow off all sidewalks as soon as possible to avoid possible fines or pedestrian injuries. In addition, if there is a fire hydrant on your property be sure to clear a 3ft radius around the hydrant and a clear path to the street. When removing snow off your sidewalk, driveway, or vehicle do not throw the snow into the street. This makes it difficult for passing plows and possible re-freezing. As always remember to help your neighbors who may require special assistance – the elderly and those with disabilities. Working together property owners and the Borough can get life back to normal as possible after a snow event.

# **Public Works Department News**

**STREET SWEEPING** – Street sweeping ends for the season the 1st week of December. Street sweeping will resume 1st week of April.

**HOLIDAY TREE DISPOSAL** – Holiday trees may be put out the 1st or 3rd Tuesday of January. Place trees curbside. Do not wrap trees in plastic tree bags -- our hauler will not pick up bagged trees.

**PUBLIC WORKS CONTACT INFORMATION** – Answering machine 215-628-9409. Contact the Borough Garage or the Borough receptionist to report a pothole, broken playground equipment or damaged signage.

**TRAFFIC & STREET LIGHT OUTAGES** – If a traffic or streetlight is out, please alert the Borough receptionist at 215-646-1000 or send an email to receptionist@borough.ambler.pa.us . For streetlight outages, please try to obtain and report the pole number. This will help us to more quickly relay the information to schedule a repair.

**LABEL YOUR RECYCLE & TRASH ROLLCARTS** – Please be aware that grey trash and blue recycle roll carts have gone missing. Residents are advised to put their house number on these carts. Please contact the Borough Receptionist if the wheels (and axles) on your roll carts are in need of repair. Public Works will replace these parts at no cost to you. Please do not throw out the cart.

# **Water Department News**

- The Water Payment Lock Box is located at the Borough Hall parking lot. You may access the lock box from the Poplar Street parking lot entrance.
- During these troubled times, water customers may have difficulty budgeting to pay the water bill. The Water Department is willing to work with you by setting up payment arrangements if you are enduring hardship. Please contact the Water Department to speak with a billing clerk.
- System Hydrant Flushing When Ambler Water Dept. conducts routine system hydrant flushing a flushing schedule will be posted on the Borough website– check back often. If you experience discolored water, DO NOT OPEN THE HOT WATER SIDE OF YOUR FAUCET this will bring discolored water into the hot water tank. RUN COLD WATER only from your faucet for several minutes. Continue repeating this process until the water runs clear. If discoloration is severe, it also is suggested, if you have a water softener, that you by-pass the water softener until the situation is 'clear.' If the problem persists, contact the Water

### WATER LINE PROTECTION PROGRAM APPLICATION



What is the Water Line Protection Program? It is a lateral water line protection plan offered by Ambler Borough to our residential customers. Why do we offer this? Because the pipe that carries water from the curb to your house is on your property and the pipe is owned by you. If a leak or break in this line occurs (this is called the 'lateral line'), it is your responsibility – and your expense -- to make the repair.

With the Water Line Protection Plan offered by the Borough of Ambler, if anything happens to your water service line from the point at which it crosses the outer vertical wall of the residence to the point at which it reaches the property boundary, we'll take care of it.

This protection plan is offered to residential customers, specifically single-family dwelling & residential properties with four or fewer units on the same water meter with 5/8" to 1" water service lines. The cost is \$100 for a one-year protection plan and covers the cost to repair or replace allowing up to two repairs per year, \$3,500 per break maximum, capped at \$7,000 per year. Please be aware this Contract is held by you and not by the property. Therefore, *should you sell your property, the plan is not transferred to the new property owner.* Should you sell your property you may apply in writing for a pro-rated refund.

But most importantly, Polly gives everyone the chance to be a puppeteer!

Whatever the activity, Penn's Woods Puppets will be a valuable addition to the day.



## ■ Trash ■ Recycle ■ Yard Waste ■ Holiday

SOLID WASTE COLLECTION: All solid waste, recyclables and yard waste should be placed curb side no later than 6 A.M. the day of your scheduled pickup. Solid waste is to be placed in the gray roll cart provided by Ambler Borough. No hazardous or E-waste collected. Litter and debris can attract unwanted pests and can clog storm drains. Keep trash and recyclables covered. DO NOT LITTER.

#### RECYCLABLES COLLECTION:

Recyclables are to be placed in the blue roll cart provided by Ambler Borough. All recyclables can be mixed together and placed in this cart NO SORTING NEEDED. Recycle newspapers, inserts & junk mail, magazines, catalogs & envelopes, paper back books & phone books, cardboard & clean pizza boxes, office & school papers (colored paper), box board (cereal, cake & cracker boxes); waxed cartons (milk, juice & soup containers); paper egg cartons, paper bags, aluminum cans & clean foil; tin & empty steel aerosol cans, empty glass jars & bottles, and all plastic containers labeled #1-#7. Clean and Rinse please.

### PUT FLEXIBLE PLASTICS IN YOUR CURBSIDE RECYCLING CART.

Flexible plastic packaging can now be placed in your recycling carts. Flexible packaging is any plastic packaging that is able to flex or wrap such as plastic pouches, wraps, and bags. For example: Grocery Bags, Retail Bags, Pet Treat Pouches, Detergent Pouches, Case Wrap, Shrink Film, Food Storage Bags, Snack Food Pouches, Salad Bags, Wipes Pouches, Candy Pouches, Baby Food Pouches, Bread Bags, Diaper Wrap Packaging (No Diapers New or Used), Air Pillows, Bubble Wrap, Pet Food Bags, Cereal Bags, Paper Towel Overwrap, Chip Bags, Meat Bags, Cheese Bags and Drink Pouches. **DO NOT PUT THE FOLLOWING ITEMS IN CART**: NO Mirrors, NO food waste, NO polystyrene cups/plates, NO motor oil/hazardous chemical containers, NO plastic toys or sporting goods, NO electronics or batteries, NO compact discs/DVDs, NO foam egg cartons or ice cream containers, NO light bulbs, hangers or yard waste.

**BULK COLLECTION:** One bulk item (mattress, desk, etc.) per household is permitted per week. **No Tires, No TVs or Computers.** Call J.P. Mascaro & Sons at **1-800-432-1616** for "white" item pickup.

For items containing Freon (refrigerators, etc) visit Montgomery County's website <a href="https://www.montcoparecycles.org">www.montcoparecycles.org</a> or 610-278-3618 for a list of companies that will remove Freon and dispose of the appliance for a fee. At no cost to you, call PECO Smart Ideas (888-573-2672) for collection of working frigs & freezers (10-30 cuft). Residents must be on site at time of scheduled pick-up.

Mattresses and box springs must be bagged and sealed in plastic mattress bags when placed curbside. Items may be set out on your regularly scheduled bulk service day. All mattresses and box springs must now be <u>wrapped in plastic</u> before collection. Recent infestations of bed bugs have spread from mattresses to employees as they make curbside pickups. You can find mattress disposal bags at most major retailers and home improvement stores, such as Home Depot, Lowe's, Walmart, Amazon.com, etc.

YARD WASTE COLLECTION: Yard waste shall be placed in paper bags or unlined trash cans or may be bundled with twine. No plastic bags. Yard waste includes leaves, branches and branch materials, twig material, vine and hedge trimmings. No grass clippings. Residents may also bring yard waste to Barnside Farm Compost Facility, 991 Haldeman Rd, Schwenksville, contact at 610-287-8880.

As we come up on the end of another year, I would like to again thank everyone for their patience with the continued suspension of in-person collections the first half of this year, and for wearing masks during in-person hours this second half.

At this point in the year the deadline for the discount on your Wissahickon School District real estate tax bill has passed, and we are in the face period. The deadline for paying this is October 31. I do accept postmarks, however, I cannot accept face value after the deadline, so if you are mailing your bills, please consider doing so at least a week before the deadline. After October 31, there will be a 10% penalty added to the face value of your bill. For anyone who has not yet paid the County/Borough real estate tax bill, that is in the penalty period.

My office hours for in-person payments are Tuesdays from 9am-1pm. My office is located at 262 N. Spring Garden St (between Mount Pleasant and Rieffs Mill Roads). For special needs accommodations, call me at 215-367-5663 or email me at amblerborotaxcollector@gmail.com and I will be happy



to work with you to set up a time/place that works for you. However, please note that I cannot always accommodate last minute requests, so please plan accordingly.

Other methods of paying include mail (P.O. Box 3087, Ambler, PA 19002), lockbox located on the porch of 262 N. Spring Garden St., online using a credit card or e-check, or on the phone using a credit card. Please note that credit card payments include a 2.65% fee and e-checks have a flat \$1.50 fee. The link to the online system is available on the Borough website, boroughofambler. com. If you pay online, a receipt will be emailed to you. If you want a receipt when paying by mail or lockbox, please include a self-addressed stamped envelope and BOTH copies of the bill.

Please note that I am closed on weekends, evenings, and holidays. This includes primary and election days. If you call or email on these days/times, there will be a delay in me responding to you.

Many people like to pay their taxes using their bank's online bill payment. Please be careful when doing this as the payments are not automatic. It can take 3 to 5 days for me to receive your payment and, if you are close to the end of discount or face, you risk the payment being late and missing the deadline, which will result in you owing more.

Please make sure that you checks are made payable to Jennifer Stomsky, Tax Collector or Ambler Borough Tax Collector. Please DO NOT make your checks payable to Ambler Borough. They will need to be returned. Also, please be sure that your parcel number and/or address are identified on your payments so that I can properly apply them. If you require a receipt, please enclose both halves of the bill and a SASE with your payment and one will be sent back to you.

As we come to the end of the year, please remember that any bills not paid in full by December 31st will be delinquent and subject to additional penalties. Personal checks WILL NOT be accepted after December 15th. From December 15 to 31 payments must be made by certified check, money order, cash (exactly amount only), credit card (online or by phone), or online by e-check.




