

Keeping Storm Runoff Clean

As many residents and business owners of the Borough of Ambler are aware, the Borough is responsible for monitoring the storm sewer system for pollutants and to remove, or direct to have removed, any identified sources of any pollution. The program is known as the National Pollution Discharge Elimination System Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System, NPDES MS4 for short. In the case of stormwater, a pollutant is basically anything that is not rain water or snow melt. Common pollutants in stormwater come from pet waste in yards, over fertilizing of lawns, washing vehicles in driveways or streets, and improper disposal of cleansers, oil, and paint.

As one can imagine, a good deal of rain falls on the Borough each year. On average, the Borough receives about four feet of rain annually. Anyone who has witnessed a heavy thunderstorm in late summer or snow storm followed by high temperatures in the winter will not argue that runoff from a large storm can cause a great deal of damage and wash a lot of sediment, branches, trees and other materials into the storm drains and streams. While the effect of runoff is easily observed during heavy storms, the effects from light rainfall are equally important. Even a light rain washes sediment, nutrients, oil and other surface pollutants into the streams. All the dirt, oil, lawn fertilizer, road salt, leaves, grass clipping, pet waste, etc. that washes away with even a light rain ends up as pollution in Wissahickon Creek. The NPDES MS4 program requires that the Borough monitor all storm sewer outfalls within the Borough for various types of pollutants and take corrective action if needed. With cooperation and effort from

- 🙆 Never dump anything down storm drains or in streams
- 🙆 Use the appropriate amount of deicer
- 🙆 Vegetate bare spots in your yard

- Follow directions when applying pesticides, and learn how to prevent pest problems
- Oirect downspouts away from paved surfaces; consider a rain garden to capture runoff
- 💧 Check your car for leaks and recycle your motor oil

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The Wire Recycling Process

When thinking of recycling, we typically think of paper, plastics, and cans. But there is something else found all throughout our lives that you may not have considered as recyclable—wires. Wires run through our homes and workspaces, power our appliances, and charge our phones. Copper conducts electric current better than any other metal except silver and is the favored material for electrical wires. According to the Copper Development Association Inc., an average single-family home contains 439 pounds of copper.

Copper is essential to powering many aspects of our daily lives, and it is important to recycle this material. The EPA estimates that recycling copper requires only 10-15% of the energy required to mine and refine virgin copper, saving energy and keeping valuable resources out of landfills.

Locally, Pasco Inc., a metals recycling facility in Philadelphia, buys and processes copper-insulated wire for recycling. This recycling process starts with baled wire. The wire can be sourced from all over, including construction, appliances, and even nuclear power plants! While the source and size of these wires can vary greatly, they all have something in common: a copper core.

To begin the recycling process, the copper must be removed from the insulation. To do this, wires are first sent through a series of three chopping machines. These machines mechanically break down the wire into small pieces and remove the insulation from around the copper.

Now that the copper is free from the insulation, the two materials

must be separated. The finely chopped material moves to a shaker table-- a tilted surface that shakes rapidly, separating the copper pieces from the insulation. The heavier pieces (the copper) migrate to the higher end of the table, while the lighter insulation moves to the lower end of the table. This process is very effective in separating the copper from the insulation, which is an important step in maintaining the copper's recyclability. The copper found in electrical wires is 99.99% copper. It is important to maintain this high grade of purity so that it can be melted down and recycled into new wires. Pasco Inc. has looked for markets to recycle the insulation stream of this recycling process, but currently this material is landfilled.

There are many environmental benefits to recycling wires, but due to the value of copper and its recyclability, you can also get paid for it! Many scrap metal yards will weigh and pay you for your old wires and electrical cords. So, before you toss that frayed cord or tangled wire mess into the trash, consider taking it to your local scrap yard for recycling.

Municipal and state regulations require that residents, commercial establishments, and non-residential establishments recycle all recyclable materials. Commonly recycled materials include paper, plastic, glass, and metal. You should check with your hauler for a complete list of acceptable recyclable materials.



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
Ambler EAC EarthFest 2022 - April 30th



Speaking of change, hopefully spring weather comes sooner than later. There are several reminders we have listed below that will help the residents of Ambler enjoy the warm weather that we are all looking

More pedestrians will be out crossing the streets at intersections. Remember they have the right of way when crossing on a green light and you are turning in your vehicle.

Be aware of bicyclists and please share the road with them. They have a legal right to be using the same roadway as vehicular traffic.

- Do not text while driving/ hands free phone calls.
- If you are involved in a motor vehicle accident always call the Police.
- Make sure you are committed to the habit of locking your vehicle every time you use it.
- Take the necessary security precautions with your home by locking doors and windows.
- Call 911 if you see any suspicious activity. Be prepared to answer questions regarding specifics from the dispatcher on the activity you are reporting.
- If you have surveillance cameras please contact us so we can add you to our registry. This will help us when incidents happen in your area. You can register your camera by going on our Crimewatch page.
- Street sweeping starts in April, however we will give you a two week grace period before enforcement starts. Your vehicle still needs to be moved.
- Be aware of the common contractor fraudulent schemes. If you have doubt of the services offered please call 911.
- Always check on elderly neighbors, this is a yearlong responsibility. However, with extreme temperatures it is even more important.

Ambler Borough Human Relations Commission (HRC)

The Ambler Human Relations Commission (to be referred to as HRC) was established on May 17, 2016, by Borough Ordinance #1098. This ordinance specifies that discrimination is prohibited in housing and commercial property, employment and public accommodation on the basis of actual or perceived race, color, age, familial status, religious creed, ancestry, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression, national origin, handicap or disability, use of guide or support animals due to blindness, deafness or physical handicap of the user or in the event that the user is a handler/trainer for a support/guide animal. The designated characteristics listed above, define aspects of being part of a "protected class".

If you live or work in the Borough of Ambler and feel that you have been discriminated against based on being a part of any "protected class", under this ordinance, you may contact the **Borough's HRC** by calling 215-646-1000 to leave a message for a return contact from the HRC. Be sure to designate that you are requesting contact from an HRC representative. An HRC representative will contact you to discuss your concern, ascertain whether the "protected class designation" covers your concern, is within their jurisdiction, and provide a complaint form as indicated. **HRC MEMBERS:** Denise Valerio (Chair), Anna Lee Lapinski, Marilyn Frazier, Trelana Adams, Katie Kirszenblat, and Mary Wingfield (Alternate).

Summer Fire Safety Tips

Summer is a time for fun, but it is important to make sure you and your family are cautious when using fireworks, grills, and other potentially dangerous materials. Here are some tips for keeping you and your family safe this summer.

According to the Consumer Product Safety Commission, there were 15,600 injuries from fireworks in 2020. The safest thing you can do to prevent injuries from fireworks is to leave the show up to the experts and attend one of the many professionally done fireworks shows in the region. There are not many places in Ambler where you can use fireworks and not risk a fire or disturb the neighbors.

The second type of incident we see a sharp rise in during the summer months is the number of issues caused by grills. You want to make certain your grill is at least 10 feet away from any combustibles, including combustible decking. You also want to make sure you clean your grill regularly to prevent the build up of grease which is the biggest cause of grill fires. Also remember to keep children and pets away from the grill when in use and never leave a grill unattended.

Lastly, the best defense we have for detecting a fire in the home is the installation of a smoke detector. One should be located on each level of your home and there should be one in each bedroom. Since we just changed our clocks, you should have also changed the batteries in your smoke detectors and remember to check the operation of your detector monthly.



Parks and Recreation Committee News

Parks Plan - The Borough Planning Commission is currently working on completing the Park System Plan incorporating and prioritizing all of the recommendations / suggestions from the workshops via zoom and the survey late last year. These were great sources of input from the public and the Borough was beyond impressed with the interest from Borough residents in the Borough Parks. The Planning Commission hopes to have the Parks System Plan completed this summer.

Community Garden - While the soil rested, the steering committee was busy planning the installation of the community garden at Knight Park. It will be located adjacent to the block house on the former location of the bocce courts along Church Street. With community input they developed the plan shown here with an aerial layout and future rendering viewed from Church Street. Over the winter the ground was leveled, and a fence installed with preparations continuing for an early summer ribbon cutting. Funding for the garden was made possible with a Montco 2040 grant which assists municipalities in making targeted physical improvements that achieve progress toward goals of Montgomery County comprehensive plan's themes of Connected Communities, Sustainable Places, and Vibrant Economy.

Ambler Square dedication November 6, 2021


Ambler Square - The borough's newest park Ambler Square, at the southeast corner of Butler and Park Avenues, was dedicated on November 6, 2021! This 10,000 sq ft park was designed and secured with a \$102,000 dollar grant from the PA Department of Conservation and Natural Resources to create the urban oasis you see today. Ambler Square has the potential to become a lively community space that highlights the use of sustainable materials and practices, like the use of pervious pavers, and native landscaping along with stormwater management. Also, a great central outdoor event space for people of all ages to gather for events or take a rest on a bench in the shady grove of ginkgo trees.

Plastics Ordinance - In January, Borough Council voted to delay approving the Single Use Plastic Ordinance No. 1126, to allow additional time for community outreach and stabilization of the supply chain. Borough Council will update and refine the ordinance originally drafted in 2019. Public meetings will be held later this spring and early summer. Re-Energizing Procedure Following Flooding Events

In the event of flooding, PECO cannot restore electric or natural gas service to residential and commercial properties prior to completion of all required safety inspections. In some cases, PECO may be forced to shut off service to homes and businesses in flooded areas due to safety concerns.

What is PECO's policy regarding restoration of service in flooded conditions? PECO is responsible for servicing only its equipment up to and including the meter. In the event of severe flooding around natural gas meters, appliances, and/or electrical equipment, PECO is obligated by the state Public Utility Commission to not restore electric or natural gas service if it cannot ensure the safety of the service before restoration. PECO will work in cooperation with local code enforcement officials to ensure public safety. Costs of repairs and safety inspections are the responsibility of the customer.

What must customers do to have electric service restored? In cases where the customer's electric meter or circuit distribution panel have been submerged, the following procedures must be followed: The customer must first arrange for a licensed electrician to perform inspection of their wiring and circuitry. The electrician must satisfy all municipal code requirements, including (if applicable) completion of the appropriate certification forms from the customer's municipality. A third-party electrical underwriter inspector must then examine the internal electrical system, affix a certification seal on the meter panel verifying safety, and provide PECO with the proper notification. The customer should also inform PECO that all repairs and inspections have been completed by calling PECO Customer Service at 1-800-494-4000. PECO then will re-energize electric service to the property. This process is a requirement of the National Electric Safety Code (NESC).

Customers can find an electrical contractor or inspector through the Electrical Association of Philadelphia (EAP) at www.eap.org or by calling 610-825-1600.

What must customers do to have natural gas service restored? Restoration of natural gas service is separate and independent of the electric service. If power is restored to the property, a separate evaluation must be performed by local code officials and/or the fire marshal to verify that the customer's fuel line and natural gas appliance are safe and suitable for gas service to be restored. Based on the extent of the water damage to natural gas appliance(s), some customers may need to work with a licensed plumber/ HVAC contractor to disconnect and isolate the impacted sections of customer fuel line and appliance(s) to get gas restored to the remainder of the natural gas appliances that were not impacted by the flood. PECO's customers with natural gas service who experience any service problem or notice natural gas odors should contact the company immediately at 1-800-841-4141.

Emergency and Safety Tips for All Customers: Keep the number of an electrician or plumber handy as part of emergency preparations. Do not enter basements that are flooded; the water at certain levels could be energized. PECO encourages customers to unplug sensitive electronic appliances like computers, televisions and microwaves. This will protect the equipment from potentially damaging power surges. However, leave at least one light on so you'll know when power is restored.

SOLID WASTE COLLECTION: All solid waste, recyclables and yard waste should be placed curb side no later than 6 A.M. the day of your scheduled pickup. Solid waste is to be placed in the gray roll cart provided by Ambler Borough. No hazardous or E-waste collected. Litter and debris can attract unwanted pests and can clog storm drains. Keep trash and recyclables covered. DO NOT LITTER.

RECYCLABLES 🛟 COLLECTION:

Recyclables are to be placed in the blue roll cart provided by Ambler Borough. All recyclables can be mixed together and placed in this cart **NO SORTING NEEDED**. Recycle newspapers, inserts & junk mail, magazines, catalogs & envelopes, paper back books & phone books, cardboard & clean pizza boxes, office & school papers (colored paper), box board (cereal, cake & cracker boxes); waxed cartons (milk, juice & soup containers); paper egg cartons, paper bags, aluminum cans & clean foil; tin & empty steel aerosol cans, empty glass jars & bottles, and all plastic containers labeled #1-#7. Clean and Rinse please.

PUT FLEXIBLE PLASTICS IN YOUR CURBSIDE RECYCLING CART.

Flexible plastic packaging can now be placed in your recycling carts. Flexible packaging is any plastic packaging that is able to flex or wrap such as plastic pouches, wraps, and bags. For example: Grocery Bags, Retail Bags, Pet Treat Pouches, Detergent Pouches, Case Wrap, Shrink Film, Food Storage Bags, Snack Food Pouches, Salad Bags, Wipes Pouches, Candy Pouches, Baby Food Pouches, Bread Bags, Diaper Wrap Packaging (No Diapers New or Used), Air Pillows, Bubble Wrap, Pet Food Bags, Cereal Bags, Paper Towel Overwrap, Chip Bags, Meat Bags, Cheese Bags and Drink Pouches. Additional information regarding curbside collection of flexible plastics can be found at <u>www.jpmascaro.com</u>

DO NOT PUT THE FOLLOWING ITEMS IN CART: NO Mirrors, NO food waste, NO polystyrene cups/plates, NO motor oil/hazardous chemical containers, NO plastic toys or sporting goods, NO electronics or batteries, NO compact discs/DVDs, NO foam egg cartons or ice cream containers, NO light bulbs, hangers or yard waste. BULK COLLECTION: One bulk item (mattress, desk, etc.) per household is permitted per week. No Tires, No TVs or Computers. Call J.P. Mascaro & Sons at 1-800-432-1616 for "white" item pickup.

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For items containing Freon (refrigerators, etc) visit Montgomery County's website <u>www.montcoparecycles.org</u> or 610-278-3618 for a list of companies that will remove Freon and dispose of the appliance for a fee. At no cost to you, call PECO Smart Ideas (888-573-2672) for collection of working frigs & freezers (10-30 cuft). Residents must be on site at time of scheduled pick-up.

Mattresses and box springs must be bagged and sealed in plastic mattress bags when placed curbside. Items may be set out on your regularly scheduled bulk service day. All mattresses and box springs must now be <u>wrapped in plastic</u> before collection. Recent infestations of bed bugs have spread from mattresses to employees as they make curbside pickups. You can find mattress disposal bags at most major retailers and home improvement stores, such as Home Depot, Lowe's, Walmart, Amazon.com, etc.

YARD WASTE COLLECTION: Yard waste shall be placed in paper bags or unlined trash cans or may be bundled with twine. No plastic bags. Yard waste includes leaves, branches and branch materials, twig material, vine and hedge trimmings. No grass clippings. Residents may also bring yard waste to Barnside Farm Compost Facility, 991 Haldeman Rd, Schwenksville, contact at 610-287-8880.

NOTES FROM THE TAX COLLECTOR

Thank you for re-electing me. I look forward to serving Ambler Borough as your tax collector for another term.

By the time you are reading this, you have already received your County/Borough bill and have probably noticed that it looks different than it used to. Hopefully you took time to review it carefully and discovered that all the information previously located on the front of the bill can now be found on the back. Please review this information carefully as many of the common questions I receive are already answered on the bill.

Some dates to remember: The County/Borough tax bills are mailed on March 1st.

- The discount (2%) period is from March 1st until April 30th.
- The face value period is from May 1st until June 30th.
- Bills paid after June 30th (until December 31st) will include a 10% penalty.
- The School tax bill is mailed on July 1st.
- The discount (2%) period is from July 1st until August 31st.
- The face value period is from September 1st until October 31st.
- Bills paid after June 30th (until December 31st) will include a 10% penalty.

If you would like to pay your school bill using the three coupons that accompany it, you **must** pay the first coupon on or before July 31st. If you choose this option, please remember to pay the next two coupons on September 15th and October 31st, or you will be subject to a 10% penalty. Also, please keep in mind that you do not get the 2% discount with this option.

Per Wissahickon School District Resolution W-11-21, Continuation of Real Estate Tax Installment Payment Plan (effective 01-Jul-2021), a taxpayer who is delinquent by more than ten (10) days on more than 2 installment payments is ineligible for the installment payment option in the following fiscal year beginning July 1.

Interim taxes are collected all year. These are extra taxes assessed when you make renovations to your home.

My office hours for in-person payments are Tuesdays from 9am-1pm. My office is located at 262 N. Spring Garden St (between Mount Pleasant and Rieffs Mill Roads). For other times or special needs accommodations, call me at 215-367-5663 or email me at amblerborotaxcollector@gmail.com and I will be happy to work with you to set up a time/place that works for you. However, **please note that I cannot always accommodate last minute requests, so please plan accordingly, and allow 24-48 hours advance notice.**

I have extra in-person collection hours scheduled during the last two weeks of discount. Please review the information on your bill carefully for details. I am closed on weekends, evenings, and holidays. This includes election days.

Until further notice, MASKS ARE REQUIRED FOR IN-PERSON PAYMENTS.

Additional methods of paying include mail (P.O. Box 3087, Ambler, PA 19002), lockbox located on the porch of 262 N. Spring Garden St., online using a credit card or e-check, or in person using a credit card. Please note that credit card payments include a 2.65% or \$3 minimum fee and e-checks have a flat \$1.50 fee. The link to the online system is available on the Borough website, boroughofambler. com. If you pay online, a receipt will be emailed to you. If you want a receipt when paying by mail or lockbox, please include a selfaddressed stamped envelope and BOTH copies of the bill. Please do not send in payment without the tax collector portion (bottom half) of your bill. It helps me to identify what parcel is being paid, which assures that your bills are paid correctly and in a timely manner. Please do not staple or tape your checks to your bills.

Many people like to pay their taxes using their bank's online bill payment. Please be careful when doing this as the payments are not automatic. It can take 3 to 5 days for me to receive your payment, and if you are close to the end of discount or face you risk the payment being late and missing the deadline, which will result in you owing more.

TOILET LEAK DETECTION

Toilet leaks always get larger and cost you more the longer you wait! Even if you have a 'silent' leak, you may be losing a lot of water. A toilet leak adds to your water bill and can cost you hundreds of dollars!

Sources of the leak may be:

- The flapper valve and valve seat have deteriorated or corroded
 - The flush arm and lift chain are not working properly
 - The water level in the tank is too high and spills into the overflow tub
 - The float rod, ballcock and/or float ball are corroded

Perform a leak test:

- Wait 5-10 minutes after the last flush cycle to perform the leak test
- Remove the cover. Gently drop several drops of food dye into the tank. DO NOT FLUSH
- Wait 15-20 minutes
- If the dye color appears in the toilet bowl, you have a leak.

This article is for informational use only. You may need to contact a plumber.

- The Water Payment Lock Box is located at the Borough Hall parking lot. You may access the lock box from the Poplar Street parking lot entrance.
- You may sign up to receive email notification that the Water Bill is being mailed out. Please visit www.boroughofambler.com and click on "Water Portal" on the homepage.
- On-line credit card & E-check payments are accepted for water bill payments. Please visit www.boroughofambler.com and click on "Pay Your Water Bill" on the homepage. A convenience fee will be charged.
- Please pay your Water Bill separately from other bills you may pay in the Borough, such as rental registration, tax bills or permit

fees, so that your account is properly credited. Water Bills are mailed out quarterly.

• Please keep your contact information with the Water Department current, simply by accessing the Swiftreach[™] icon on the Borough website homepage. In the event of a water quality emergency, we need to get in touch with our customers!

LIHWAP May Be Able To Assist You With Overdue Water and Wastewater Bills

What is LIHWAP? The Low-Income Household Water Assistance Program (LIHWAP) is a temporary emergency program to help low-income families pay overdue water bills. LIHWAP is a grant – you do not have to repay it. You do not need to be on public assistance however, you must meet certain LIHWAP income guidelines. You need to have an unpaid water bill. You can either rent or own your home.

How does LIHWAP work? Grants may be available if you have an emergency situation and may lose your water service. You can receive one Crisis grant for your drinking water service and one for your wastewater service, up to \$2,500 each. Crisis situations include past-due water bills, termination of water utility service, or having received notice that service will be shut-off within the next 60 days.

How to apply? Apply online at www.compass.state.pa.us or request an application by calling the Statewide Customer Service Center at 877-395-8930 or call PA Relay at 711 for the hearing impaired. Applications are available at your local County Assistance Office. You must work directly with LIHWAP and not the Ambler Borough Water Department. LIHWAP will only contact the Ambler Borough Water Department. once your application has been filed with LIHWAP so that they can verify your account's status with us.



Ambler Borough Planning Commission – What Is Its Function?


The Ambler Borough Planning Commission consists of nine residents appointed by Borough Council who serve for staggered terms of four years. These dedicated volunteers with various backgrounds and insights are tasked with being the starting point for most development and changes in the Borough as the first step in the planning process.

The functions of the Planning Commission are to review subdivisions, land development plans, conditional use applications and lot line changes, assist in development of zoning and other Ordinances such as Historic Preservation at the direction of Borough Council. The Planning Commission works toward providing for the coordinated development of the Borough and the general welfare of its people.

Because planning is a continuous process which shapes and guides the physical growth of the Borough in harmony with its social and economic needs, the Planning Commission urges all members of the public to attend its meetings and make known their views. Regular monthly meetings are held in Ambler Borough Meeting Hall, the fourth Tuesday of every month at 7pm. Special meetings and date changes will be announced and advertised as scheduled. Materials and agenda for the meeting are posted a day in advance of each meeting. All meeting minutes and agendas are posted on the Borough website under government-boards / committees – planning commission. Look forward to seeing you at the next Planning Commission meeting.
